Directions to Recreational Walking Trails

Greenfield Trail System

The Cherry Blossom Trail section is 8 feet wide and has an ADA accessible stone surface. The trail can be open for foot traffic and bicycles and is approximately .88 miles in length. No motorized vehicles or horses.

The Boyer Holiday Trail section is a natural grass surface trail that meanders through the preservation area of Greenfield and connects the historic Holiday/Boyer home with two family cemeteries. The trail can be open for foot traffic only and is approximately .86 miles in length. No motorized vehicles or horses.

The Colonial William Preston Trail section is a natural grass trail that meanders around Greenfield Lake and connects the Cherry Blossom Trail section with the Greenfield Recreation Trail. The trail is open to foot traffic and is approx 2.4 miles in length.

The Greenfield Recreation Trail section is a natural grass trail that encompasses the entire 125-acre Greenfield Recreation Park. The trail is open to foot traffic, mountain bikes, and horseback and is approximately 3.10 miles in length.

From I-81 Exit 150B, proceed on U.S. 220 North approximately 3.5 miles and turn left onto International Parkway. Take immediate right turn into gravel drive for parking and start of trail.

A second trail parking area can also be accessed by bypassing the parking area and proceeding down International Parkway for another .5 miles and enter into the small gravel lot on right side of road.

A third trail parking area can be accessed at Greenfield Recreation Park on Etzler Rd. From I-81 Exit 150B, proceed on U.S. 220 North approximately 2.5 miles and turn right onto Catawba Rd. Continue on Catawba Rd for approx 1.8 miles and turn right onto Etzler Rd. Continue on Etzler for approx 1 mile and turn right onto Preston Parkway at the Recreation Park. Parking is available along Preston or in grass overflow parking area near soccer fields.

Blue Ridge Park Trail

The Blue Ridge Park Trail is a combination trail of natural grass, compacted stone and paved asphalt that encompasses Blue Ridge Park. The trail also meanders through the woods bordering the Blue Ridge Parkway and overlooks a farm vineyard. The trail is open to foot and bicycle traffic and is approximately .65 miles in length.

From the Bonsack area, take 460 East through Wal-Mart intersection. After passing Bank of Botetourt and State Farm offices on right, take the next right on State Rte 738 (Webster Road). Proceed two miles and turn left onto Park Drive where you'll see the sign for Blue Ridge Park. Proceed to end of Park Drive and enter parking lot.

Blue Ridge Springs Trail Loop

The Blue Ridge Springs Trail Loop is a natural surface trail that meanders through the woods of Boxley Park and offers some great overlooks of Wildcat Knob and the railroad. The trail is open to foot traffic only and is approximately .6 miles in length.

From the Bonsack area, take 460 East through Wal-Mart intersection. Proceed 4.7 miles and turn right on State Rte 616 (Blue Ridge Springs Rd). Continue a short distance and turn left onto SR 661 (Colonial Road). The park is on the right with the trail head being located in the back of the open field at the edge of the woods.

Botetourt County School Walking Tracks

All eleven Botetourt County Schools have paved walking tracks. The tracks vary from .2 to .5 miles in length and are open to foot traffic only. The tracks are only open to the public when school is not is session (evenings, weekends and summer months).
